COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. Classes typically include lectures and discussions. On occasion there may be slide presentations and film clips.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including 3 credits of 100- or 200-level ANTH.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is about archaeology and popular culture. The focus is on critically evaluating the way archaeology and archaeologists are depicted in popular culture; the way peoples of the past are depicted in popular culture; and the way archaeology and the human past are used in tourism, theme parks, and advertising.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course students will

- a) have general knowledge base about the variety of ways archaeology and peoples of the past are depicted in popular culture
- b) have a general knowledge base about the major concerns and issues archaeologists have about archaeology in popular culture
- c) have a general knowledge base about the nature of archaeology and the contexts in which it is practiced in the early 21st century
- d) have a basic knowledge of the archaeological record of the human past
- e) be familiar with the ways in which archaeologists evaluate competing explanations
- f) be able to apply critical thinking skills to popular notions about the past
- g) be familiar with some archaeological projects focussing on the excavation and analysis of sites and artifacts related to popular culture

REQUIRED TEXTS:

There are no required texts to purchase. There are, however, substantial reading requirements. Students should expect to read an average of 100 pages per week from articles and other written materials available from web links and from the instructor. Specific readings are listed on the detailed course schedule.

ASSIGNMENTS:
