This course is an intensive, advanced course in acting techniques. Students will learn how to face the technical, personal and professional challenges of developing a successful career in the competitive world of acting in film and television.

ASSIGNMENTS

Solo In-Class Assignments

Individual in-class assignments may include performing a film monologue to camera that employs the ideas introduced in class.

Group In-Class Assignments

Group In-Class Assignments may include workshops for scenes, or performing a scene on camera with a partner or small group.

Written Assignments

Written assignments may include approach papers, where students articulate their goals and ideas in approaching a particular scene, or reflections, where students have a chance to evaluate themselves, the work they did, and goals for future work.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.
