### **COURSE FORMAT**

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. This course may be offered in mixed-mode or online format.

## CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce students to the components of the Canadian legal system, and will examine the effect of both common and statute law on business relationships. Students will gain exposure to the basic principles of Canadian business law through legal topics such as constitutional, tort, contract, property, corporate and employment law.

### **COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

### On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

1. Demonstrate basic legal literacy by summarizing, analyzing, and commentary on legal issues presenting convincing legal arguments and conclusions to peers.

- 2. Analyse and distinguish the types and sources of law, including how law is made and changed in Canada, and demonstrate how laws affect Canadian businesses.
- 3. Develop an organizational structure for a particular business, considering the advantages and disadvantages of different structures.
- 4. Explain the role law plays in both structuring society and responding to changes in Canadian society including within Indigenous communities.
- 5. Describe the strengths, limitations, and difficulties of legal regulation of business and other activity recognizing the global, societal, environmental and historical complexities of Canadian context.

# Students who complete this Self and Society course will be able to do the following:

- 1. Identify potential root causes of local/global problems and how they affect local/global cultures, economies, politics, and policies.
- 2. Assess and evaluate individual and collective responsibilities within a diverse and interconnected global society.
- 3. Explain how contexts (e.g. cultural, historical, colonial, economic, technological) shape identity formation and social structures.
- 4. Synthesize a range of differing community perspectives on ethics and justice and explain how these perspectives can inform structural change.

# **COURSE CONTENT**

- Introduction to Canadian legal systems and acknowledging the pre-existence of the law of Indigenous peoples (2 weeks)
- Dispute resolution (1 week)
- Intentional torts and negligence (1 week)
- Basis of a contract (1 week)
- Factors affecting the contractual relationship (1 week)
- The End of the Contractual Relationship (1 week)
- Employment law (1 week)
- Business organizations (1 week)
- Property law (acknowledging the impact of property law on indigenous peoples) (1 week)
- Law of credit and finance (1 week)
- Sales of Goods Act and consumer protection legislation (1 week)
- International trade law (1 week)

Violations of academic integrity, including dishonesty in assignments, examinations, or other academic performances, are prohibited and will be handled in accordance with the Student Academic Integrity Procedures.

**Academic dishonesty** is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

**Cheating**: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

**Misuse or misrepresentation of sources**: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

**Plagiarism**: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

**Self-Plagiarism**: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
