COURSE FORMAT

Supervised applied learning experience for a minimum of 100 hours over a 15-week semester.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

54 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including ENGL 100 and BADM 101; OR 6 NABU credits and BADM 305.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

An independent study course is a special course tailored to permit an individual student to pursue specific in-depth studies under the supervision and instruction of an Instructor. Independent study courses offer the chance to study subjects that would not otherwise be available to the student and to pursue unique topics independently and in depth. In this course, students will concentrate on depth of business knowledge, a grasp of the particular methods and approaches to business in a given field, and an understanding of the type of analysis appropriate to it.

COURSE NOTE

Departmental approval is required to register in this course. This course requires the ability and the discipline to work independently, and the subject of study must be one in which the student has a genuine interest.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

To be determined by agreement between the student and instructor based upon the topic.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Act as self-directed learners and independent researchers.
- Assess personal aptitude for different areas of business.

• Develop a critical understanding of and the ability to apply theoretical knowledge from the student's chosen area of focus in a research or applied learning environment

COURSE CONTENT

Students will meet the learning outcomes of the course under the guidance and direction of the faculty supervisor. Students will meet with or contact the faculty liaison regularly to discuss their progress and performance. Key components of the independent study are:

- Develop a personal independent study proposal and negotiate the outcomes and timeline with the instructor.
- Conduct detailed literature review of the chosen subject area for study
- Articulate the research question or applied project to be completed
- Define the research methodology or project plan to be followed
- Conduct the research or implement the applied project
- Articulate research findings or results of the applied project in a comprehensive, subject matter appropriate final report and/or presentation

- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
