# **COURSE FORMAT**

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through online or other activities for a 15week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

# **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION**

In this introductory Creative Writing workshop, students sharpen their writing craft by writing and workshopping in multiple genres while also studying contemporary practice. All sections of ENGL 190 involve creation of writing through prompts and exercises, editorial feedback through a variety of means, and the curation of a substantial written portfolio.

- 2. Communicate ideas through oral and written formats.

- 4. Interpret diverse literary forms from multiple perspectives (e.g. artistic, historical, political, literary, theoretical).
- 5. Recognize the limited, exclusionary, and colonial nature of the literary canon. Attend to the important work that has been done to critique, expand, and diversify the canon.
- 6. Examine literary traditions and the influence of systemic racism, colonization, and heteropatriarchal power structures in shaping literary cultures.
- 7. Analyze and synthesize course material to produce original work.
- 8. Draw upon knowledge, judgment, and imagination in work and life.
- 9. Produce a portfolio of original work.

# Students who complete this Culture and Creative Expression course will be able to do the following:

- 1. Engage in creative processes including conception, investigation, execution, and ongoing critical analysis.
- 2. Identify, analyze, and critique the element of a form of expression using its specific vocabulary.
- 3. Explain the significance of diverse forms of human creative expression, specifically including indigenous forms.
- 4. Interpret diverse forms of creative expression from different perspectives (e.g. artistic, historical, Indigenous, literary, scientific, philosophical).

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

**Misuse or misrepresentation of sources**: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

**Plagiarism**: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

**Self-Plagiarism**: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

**Prohibited Conduct**: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
