**COURSE FORMAT:** 2 lecture hours and one instructor-led lab hour per week for 15 weeks

**PREREQUISITE:** JAZZ 231 with grade of C- or higher.

**MISSION STATEMENT**: The Capilano University Jazz Studies Program seeks to foster students'

comprehensive abilities in jazz performance and composition within the context of an enriched liberal arts education. Our goal is to develop musicians who understand and value the rich history and traditions of jazz, who will be prepared to contribute to the evolution and growth of the art form in the future, and who will be equipped to engage creatively with current trends in music.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** Students will learn to arrange material from the standard jazz repertoire with

harmonized melodies in 4 and 5 parts.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- harmonize melodies for saxophones or brass in 4 and 5 parts with a variety of voicings;
- demonstrate understanding of and use them effectively in an arrangement;
- write parts for woodwinds, brass, and rhythm section which are appropriate to the instrument and the idiom and which are clear and simple for the players to read;
- reharmonize and rhythmically rephrase melodies from the jazz repertoire;
- demonstrate through their creative output a knowledge of the work of important arrangers from jazz history in terms of rhythmic, melodic, formal, and harmonic practices common to the idiom;
- create arrangements of jazz standards with intro, endings, background figures, solo sections, and other components appropriate to the idiom;
- demonstrate attention to detail and show evidence of the personal study habits and work ethic critical for professional success.

#### **COURSE CONTENT:**

1	Rhythmic paraphrase and reharmonization of jazz standards. Assignment #1.			
2	Harmonization of melodies with 4 and 5 with block, drop 2, drop 2 and 4, and 'spread' voicings.			
	Assignment #2.			
3	Part transposition and idiomatic writing for saxophones (including some woodwind doubles),			
	trumpets and trombones. Assignment #3.			
4	Assembling large-scale arrangements with standard elements including: intros, endings, codas,			
	background figures pads, soli, shout choruses. Assignment #4 preparation.			
	Assignment #4 will be performed and recorded in exam period.
