# **COURSE FORMAT**:

Three hours of class time, with an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities, for 15 weeks, which includes two weeks for final exams.

# **COURSE PREREQUISITES:**

45 credits of 100-level or higher course work including PSYC 100. NOTE: Completion of PSYC 101 is recommended.

# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course examines a range of commonly reported anomalous experiences from the critical perspective of Psychology. Unlike an Abnormal Psychology course, the focus is mainly on non-pathological experiences. The 'critical thinking' approach is reviewed; a brief historical overview of claims and critiques is presented; and several types of anomalous experience are considered with respect to the bio-psycho-social processes that affect perception, memory and belief.

# STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Use critical and analytical thinking skills to examine reports of anomalous experiences, and to weigh the evidential value of claims associated with them
- · Understand contemporary anomalous experiences within a historical context
- Exercise communication skills and social interaction skills in creating a plan for the scientific investigation of an anomalous experience report
- · Utilize research methodologies in self-directed learning to produce original work

# **REQUIRED TEXTS**:

A reading package will be available in the Capilano University Bookstore, and on-line via Moodle.

### **COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:**

### Research Paper:

A research paper of 3000-3500 words, drawing upon course themes, readings, and independently researched material.

### First In-Class Test:

Surveying course content (readings and classroom-presented material) from the first part of the semester.

#### Second In-Class Test:

Surveying course content (readings and classroom-presented material) from the second part of the semester.

<u>Final Exam</u>: A cumulative exam based on the course content (readings and classroom-presented material).

#### Fourth Hour Activities:

Participation in on-line (Moodle) forums. Each forum is based on a famous anomalous experience report (eg. a haunting, a UFO encounter, a miraculous healing). Students discuss the application of various research methods to each case. Students submit a brief written summary of one forum for grading toward the end of the semester.
