#### **COURSE FORMAT:**

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

### **COURSE PREREQUISITES:**

Note: Completion of WGST or WGST 111 is recommended.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course examines the role of gender in political and policy processes through a multidisciplinary feminist framework. The course focuses on Canadian examples, but also engages with gender and politics and public policy in a global context. The course begins by developing a conceptual framework and analytical vocabulary on gender, feminism and public life. It then uses that foundation to explore women's political participation and public policies that have a particular impact on women. It concludes by discussing both activist and institutional approaches to transforming gender politics and policy in Canada and globally. This course seeks to encourage and assist students to think critically about gender and politics, in a range of social contexts, and to develop a cooperative, shared learning environment for academic inquiry.

### **COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Differentiate among selected conceptual and theoretical frameworks that may be used to analyse the role and implications of gender in politics and policy
- Describe the historical and social development and context of feminist thought and activism in Canada and internationally
- Employ a critical perspective on contemporary issues and challenges at the intersections of gender and politics and policy
- Analyse and discuss strategies and resources for addressing these issues and challenges, including activism and policy development and change.
