3 overnight field days with 2 days pre-trip meeting.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

WLP 124

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to develop winter field leaders with effective personal and group management techniques for cold environments. This course will also provide an intermediate proficiency in the building of winter shelters and camp craft for a winter environment. Students may also earn certification and technical skills as part of the Outdoor Council of Canada (OCC) Field Leader (Winter) curriculum if industry certificate requirements are met.

COURSE NOTE

Students will be expected to provide valid certification of Field Leader (Hiking) earned in REC 148. This course consists of two pre-trip planning sessions plus a three day overnight field trip.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

1. Develop an intermediate level of proficiency for self and group care in a winter environment.

- 2. Demonstrate appropriate winter campcraft techniques, including campsite planning and construction, winter meal planning and preparation, safe hygiene practices, applying strategies to maintain body temperature.
- 3. Research, plan, and construct a snow shelter using safe and efficient building techniques.
- 4. Organize and safely conduct a small group through potential avalanche terrain.
- 5. Make effective decisions based on snow, weather and group considerations, using the Outdoor Council of Canada Field book, and industry standard information gathering.

Analyzes problems and develops sound alternatives. Takes time to think, acts rationally and avoids shortcuts. Takes charge of situations when needed and without prompting while understanding and respecting when to let others lead.

Technical skills: Develop basic outdoor skills and competencies in winter travel and avalanche awareness to an intermediate level of competency.

Professionalism and participation: Includes elements of professionalism, attitude, time management, and teamwork as described in the outdoor recreation management program skills evaluation form.

Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;

- Communicating work to another student during an examination;

- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
