Future-focused university

Squamish Campus

CapU acquired the 18-acre former Quest University site in Squamish, B.C., and opened CapU Squamish in September 2024, offering Arts, Adult Basic Education and Early Childhood Education courses at launch. This new location enables CapU to serve students, collaborate with education partners and grow research and innovation opportunities in the Sea-to-Sky corridor.



North Vancouver Student Housing Slated to open in 2025, this <u>362-bed housing complex</u> is designed to create a contemporary, sustainable housing option that provides safe, conveniently located, below-marketrate accommodations for students attending CapU who want to live on-campus.



Centre for Childhood Studies

Opening in 2025, the child-inspired, purpose-designed Centre will create a dedicated home for the School of Education and Childhood Studies and make space for a second childcare centre on campus, which helps meet an urgent need in British Columbia. The Centre integrates research, teaching and learning spaces in one location to provide a lab school education.
