COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time plus one hour delivered through on-line activities or other activities (on-line learning and language workshop), one hour of conversation with a Language Associate and a 45-minute drop-in session of self-study at the Language Resource Centre (LRC, AR 117) for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

FREN 121 or FREN 150 or French 12

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course should be taken after Grade 12 core French. It continues the linguistic development of the student by means of grammar revision, weekly written and oral exercises, compositions and appreciation of francophone culture and literature. FREN 205 and 204 address different linguistic skills and can be taken in any order; however, after having taken both, students should be at the intermediate French level.

COURSE NOTE

FREN 205 is an approved Culture and Creative Expression course for Cap Core requirements.

FREN 205 is equivalent to FREN 171.

Duplicate credit will not be granted for this course and FREN 171.

This course is not appropriate for students who have studied in French Immersion or are native speakers of French.

- Explain or demonstrate the connection between various events, ideas, traditions, and belief systems and the modes in which they are artistically or culturally expressed;
- Interpret diverse forms of creative expression from different perspectives (e.g. artistic, historical, Indigenous, literary, scientific, philosophical).

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Conversation

During conversation classes, students practice speaking French in small groups. Mistakes and risk-taking are a normal part of the learning process; students are therefore encouraged to participate to the best of their ability. Students will participate in a weekly one-hour conversation seminar on a weekly basis, during which oral exercises will be conducted based on lessons learned in the lecture.

Lab (Language Resource Centre)

Language labs provide the opportunity to further develop listening and pronunciation skills. Students must attend the Language Resource Centre (LRC in Arbutus 117) to complete assigned material (typically 45 min per week). Lab work will be assessed on week 4, 8 and 12. The LRC will be open on a drop-in basis. Mark will be based on completion of weekly assignments.

Journal:

To increase written fluency, many classes will start with a brief writing session. Students will have 7-10 minutes to write as many sentences as possible on a given topic. This journal will afterwards be used as a starting point for short discussions in French with a partner, and to work on specific aspects of French written grammar. The participation mark will be based on the student's entries in his/her journal, commitment to speaking French, and being present and on-task.

Presentation:

Details will be given in class.

Tests and exam

Tests will include questions about everything that was covered in class (culture, vocabulary, grammar). A detailed list will be sent by e-mails in the few days before each test. **IMPORTANT:** several handouts will be given in class. If a student misses a class, they should contact another student who can collect that information for them.

Language Usage

Students are expected to proofread all written work for any grammatical, spelling and stylistic errors.

Electronic Devices

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
