#### **COURSE FORMAT**

This course will be offered in a synchronous or asynchronous online format or a synchronous inperson format, four hours per week for a 15-week semester (or equivalent), including two weeks (or equivalent) for final exams. For either synchronous or asynchronous online format, the instructor will provide weekly readings, and students will complete exercises and discussions. Three of the four instructional hours will be completed with lectures, and a fourth hour will consist of at-home and online work supported through eLearn.

#### **COURSE PREREQUISITES**

LAW 101, LAW 110, and LAW 210; OR 45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework

### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION**

This course will focus on two related areas of the law – human rights and 2SLGBTQI+ rights. Students will examine the history and meaning of human rights, including human duties, cultural values, group rights, legal rights, and equality. They will also examine the history and development of 2SLGBTQI+ rights in Canada in several specific areas of the law. They will gain knowledge of ongoing challenges regarding human and 2SLGBTQI+ rights, including the remedies available under Canada's Constitution and Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Finally, students will learn about the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

#### **COURSE NOTE**

LAW 329 is an approved Self and Society course for Cap Core requirements.

  - a) family law,
  - b) estates,

  - e) criminal law;
- 4. Understand and analyze equality claims under the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms;
- 5. Analyze and apply the different remedies available in human and 2SLGBTQI+ rights law under the various statutes; and
- 6. Understand the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

## Students who complete this Self and Society course will be able to do the following:

- Identify potential root causes of local/global problems and how they affect local/global cultures, economies, politics, and policies.
- Assess and evaluate individual and collective responsibilities within a diverse and interconnected global society.
- Apply concepts of sustainable development to address sustainability challenges in a global context.
- Analyze the impact of colonialism and racism on Indigenous peoples.
- Synthesize different community perspectives on ethics and justice and explain how these perspectives can inform structural change.
- Explain how contexts (eg., cultural, historical, colonial, economic, technological) shape identity formation and social structures.

# **Assignments/Final Project**

This course will either include assignments or a final project on a matter related to Canadian Human and 2SLGBTQI+ Rights.

**Misuse or misrepresentation of sources**: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

**Plagiarism**: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

**Self-Plagiarism**: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

**Prohibited Conduct**: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
