COURSE FORMAT

Three instructional hours per week and a 4th-hour equivalent hour per week for a 15-week term, which includes two weeks for final exams.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course encompasses a comprehensive overview of the rudiments of music and provides an understanding of how those elements are combined to create the various styles and genres of Western art music from Medieval times to the 20th Century. Previous experience reading music is an asset to this course but not essential.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

 read both pitch and rhythmic musical notation and be able to reproduce such notation through vocalization or clapping;

- recognize metric structures in simple and compound time and writing the same;
- understand the Circle of Fifths, key signatures, and intervals;
- identify and write scale types including major and minor;
- identify and be able to write all varieties of triads and chords including the dominant seventh and diminished seventh chords and their inversions;
- use figured bass as a constructive and analytical tool in music analysis;
- identify the key of a melody or a piece of music;
- transpose melodies and harmonic structures.

Students who complete this Numeracy course will be able to do the following:

- Apply both analytical and numerical skills to solve problems.
- Summarize and analyze data in quantitative forms.
- Interpret and draw conclusions from an analysis of quantitative data.
- Represent quantitative information in a variety of forms (e.g. symbolically, visually, numerically, and verbally).
- Incorporate quantitative evidence in support of an argument.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.
